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FAST FACTS

- Essential improvements can be made without a tax rate increase.
- All schools in the District would benefit.
- IPSD's 33 school buildings are 15-57 years old, and half were built around 35 years ago.
- Districtwide safety and security upgrades would be addressed first.
- Three schools are in worse condition than the rest and would get comprehensive updates.
- Savings generated by certain referendum projects could provide funds to help reduce class sizes and address mental health service needs.
- No new schools would be built and none would close.
- Waiting would increase the cost by at least \$16.8 million a year due to construction inflation.
- It's been 18 years since voters approved funding for school improvements.

 If approved, the District would provide updates and oversight of all referendum projects on its website and via community and board meetings.
